## Curriculum Vitae and Filmography : Mandrika Rupa

Mandrika Rupa is an independent artist, born in Gujarat, India. She came to New Zealand as a child in 1960. Her family first left India to come to N.Z. in the early 1900's.

Her artistic sense has developed out of a personal need to explore the social implications of migrant communities and the effect of the new country upon them.

Mandrika began film making in 1993 on a trip to her family village in India. Her films depict individuals from the South Pacific Indian Diaspora who live their lives outside traditional frameworks.

Relying on scant funds has made it extremely difficult, but Mandrika has managed to 'glean' the resources to produce a body of work. The voices she represents have so far been invisible or portrayed in cliché's. Mandrika's work gives viability to some of India's poorest castes that left India to carve out new lives in the South Pacific.
